MINNESOTA RIVER WATERSHED DRAINAGE COLLABORATIVE

Minnesota is renowned for its northern lakes and streams. A couple of generations ago, a legendary beer jingle celebrated Minnesota as "The Land of Sky Blue Waters." Yet, southern Minnesota waters are troubled.

The namesake feature of the state is the Minnesota River. Its watershed dominates the southern part of the state. Despite a gubernatorial promise, the advisories are still: "Do not drink from or swim in the River", "watch out" if you expect to eat the fish you might catch. The Minnesota River is prone to recurring floods, some of biblical proportions, its waters are impaired---polluted, it carries vast quantities of sediment threatening to fill in downstream areas including Lake Pepin, it is a significant contributor to the hypoxia conditions at the Gulf of Mexico. A drumbeat of reports detail and document these and other problems and adverse effects of the Minnesota River.

Many have labored to address the water conditions in the Minnesota River basin. They range from a discontinued multi-county Joint Powers Board to current periodic River Congresses to groups like the Coalition for a Clean Minnesota River (CCMR), Clean Up the River Environment (CURE), Friends of the Minnesota Valley, Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy, and various wildlife and conservation organizations. Several government agencies, ag organizations and many individuals have put their shoulders to the wheel in the efforts to address and improve water management and water quality.

The MN River Collaborative is continuation of these efforts, building on a collaborative initiated by the Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy, the Minnesota Conservation Federation, the Fish & Wildlife Alliance, the Coalition for a Clean Minnesota River, Clean Up the River Environment, the New Ulm Area Sportfishermen, the Izaak Walton League and others, including volunteer scientists, affected landowners, and concerned individuals. Over the years, these groups and others have cooperatively and separately reviewed many diverse projects including increased drainage, assessed the risk of harmful impact, participated in drainage proceedings, and in some instances litigated decisions to undertake projects that violated the law. Many of these efforts resulted in favorable outcomes or negotiated settlements. In 2017, the collaborative examined a proposed drainage project in Waseca County which remains under review.

About five years ago the Izaak Walton League with others begin examining all new drainage improvement projects in the Minnesota River watershed. It obtained key documents: petitions for projects, engineering reports, comments from interested parties, and advisory letters from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR). This became part of the Izaak Walton League's Upper Mississippi River Initiative (UMRI). This effort grew, expanded to continue the efforts of the collaborative previously summarized, and included volunteer civil engineers, lawyers, conservation activists, government agency retirees, and additional organizations. UMRI provided financial support for a part-time staff intern and expenses.

The vision for action expanded. Initially it focused on obtaining information on new drainage projects. It placed this information in a publicly available spreadsheet or matrix and looked at planned projects impact on downstream areas, especially flooding, habitat, water quality, and sedimentation. Continuing activities have ranged from critically commenting on drainage improvement projects in public hearings required by the Minnesota Drainage Code, to requesting environmental assessment worksheets, to seeking working relationships with groups like the Soil Health Coalition, to working with farmers and landowners, to consulting with the DNR, to seeking out other potentially interested organizations, to

participating in the Minnesota Drainage Working Group, to proposing legislation, to supporting litigation, and to encouraging funding of water storage to avoid the adverse effects from drainage projects. It has been open to any interested party, operated informally by consensus with informal direction and good faith collaboration.

This collaborative effort can be an effective, efficient path forward. By capitalizing on volunteer energy and expertise, it minimizes costs and avoids the redundancy and slippage of multiple organizations. Still, even this volunteer-driven effort requires financial resources to provide logistical support and to fairly compensate those who are not securely retired. At this time participating groups and individuals are exploring how best to maintain and finance the effort. Broad support will be important if we are to achieve shared objectives.

A modest proposal for future efforts is to continue to make key decisions in the larger collaborative setting and to have different groups and individuals take leadership for various areas of activity:

- -Collect basic information on drainage and other water management projects with a focus on the Minnesota River watershed,
- -Identify projects of concern,
- -Promote and participate in educational and other outreach programs with public agencies and with landowners seeking drainage,
- -Develop and advance legislative proposals and participate in policy making activity,
- -Coordinate fundraising efforts,
- -Serve as a fiscal agent,
- -Maintain publicity and media outreach,
- -Provide gentle leadership to keep collaborative effort organized and forward looking.

Again, active individuals and groups should continue to make key decisions in an inclusive, collaborative setting. Participation should be open to others who share the same vision. Each group is free to do its own fundraising and to determine what financial or staff support to provide to the collaborative efforts.

Decisions should be made by good-faith consensus. This means taking the time to listen to one another. It means seeking unanimity. It means that after having had a full opportunity for discussion, those who may disagree with a clear majority would recognize that the others will proceed.

A name for the effort is beyond the scope of this memorandum. A possibility is: "Minnesota River Collaborative."

Cumulative Effects of Agricultural Land Use and Artificial Drainage

In the last 50 years the hydrology of the Minnesota River watershed has changed dramatically. The mean discharge at Jordon has doubled from 3100 cubic feet per second (cfs) for the period 1936 through 1977 to more than 6000 cfs for the period 1978 through 2007. There has also been a threefold increase in rare and extreme flows. This change in the hydrology has been shown to principally be the result of the conversion of agricultural production from small grains and forage crops to soybeans and the more intense artificial drainage associated with the conversion.

Flow duration curves at Jordon show that frequent channel forming flows have changed significantly. During the period 1934 through 1949, a discharge of 1000 cfs was exceeded only 5 percent of the time, for the period after 1949, 1000 cfs was exceeded more than 20 percent of the time. The same is true for many of the tributaries of the Minnesota River. This change in the hydrology has been shown to principally be the result of the conversion of agricultural production from small grains and forage crops to soybeans and the more intense artificial drainage associated with the conversion.

Based on MPCA data sediment loads from the Minnesota River watershed to the Mississippi River have more than doubled over the period 1980 through 2005 from approximately 0.6 million tons per year to approximately 1.2 million tons per year. Recent studies have determined that the principal causes of the increased sediment loading have been due to the cumulative effect of artificial drainage associated with the land use changes in the watershed.

According to research conducted by the MPCA as part of the South Metro TMDL Lake Pepin is expected to be filled with sediment in 340 years at the current deposition rate. Lake Pepin is filling at ten times its natural rate. The MPCA research found that it would have taken 4000 years to fill the lake with the sediment deposition rate that existed in the 1970's. The Minnesota River contributes 85% of the sediment load.

Mississippi River flow from Minnesota is responsible for a portion of the nutrients that have created the hypoxia zone in the Gulf of Mexico. The contributing states have set goals to lower both phosphorus and nitrates in Mississippi River flow to reduce the extent of the hypoxia zone. Minnesota proposed a 20 percent reduction in the nitrate load from Minnesota by 2025. However, nitrate loads are greater because agricultural acreage and runoff from drain tile have increased. The Minnesota River is the major source of nitrate loads in Mississippi River flows.

With increasing sediment loads, phosphorus loading to Lake Pepin has increased by more than seven times the natural rate. Lake water phosphorus concentrations have increased from about 50 parts per

billion to 200 ppb, making Lake Pepin highly eutrophic. The high nutrient loads have resulted in prolific algae growth which has reduced dissolved oxygen and resulted in fish kills.

An extensive riverbank armoring project has recently been completed by the City of Mankato to stop erosion of the banks of the river and protect municipal infrastructure. A similar riverbank armoring project is proposed by the City of Savage to protect a future city park from riverbank erosion. The severe bank erosion has been caused by increased discharge, the threefold increase in rare and extreme flows and the longer duration of channel forming flows.

Developed communities and public facilities throughout the watershed have determined that new flood control efforts will be needed to protect infrastructure and development from increased river flows and the increased duration of flooding, The increased flows have also created a need for reinforcement of municipal flood control projects constructed in the past in order to provide continued protection. The City of Carver is currently modifying its flood control project to provide additional protection.

Increased sediment deposition in Pool 2 of the Mississippi River navigation channel that results from increased bank erosion has impeded downstream commercial river borne shipping and recreational boating. Dredging of the navigation channel has been limited in the last several years because of a lack of dredge spoil disposal locations which has required that the size of barge tows to be reduced increasing the cost of shipping.

Many once successful agricultural production facilities in the vicinity of the rivers in the watershed are currently subject to frequent crop losses due to flooding. A family farm in the vicinity of Jordan has been farming about 1000 acres for more than 100 years. In the first 50 years they lost their crop due to flooding once and in the next 50 years they lost their crops due to flooding more than 40 times. Since they can no longer purchase crop insurance, they no longer farm the land.

There have been suggestions that these increases in runoff and river flows have been due to increased precipitation, but that assertion has been proven to be insignificant by many investigations including by the MPCA, Belmont, Schottler and many others. Their research has shown that the change in water yield, the percentage of rainfall that runs off and is tributary to the river has more than tripled from 7 percent in the 1930's to over 20 percent at the present time.

Economic Impacts of Minnesota River Watersheds Hydrologic Change

- -The cost to implement the proposed sediment reduction strategy for the Minnesota River Watershed to meet Minnesota's water quality standards for the river.
- -The gradual loss of the recreational and scenic value of Lake Pepin and its impact on local business.
- -Flood damages resulting from higher and more frequent peak discharges and runoff volume due to agricultural drainage and more intense land use.
- -Increased dredging and dredge disposal costs for maintaining the Mississippi and Minnesota River navigation channel.
- -Dredging of marinas and barge fleeting areas along the Minnesota and Mississippi River Navigation channel and dredging for access to the navigation channel and dredge disposal costs.
- -Costs to upgrade the several flood damage reduction projects along the Minnesota River.
- -The lost recreational value of the Minnesota River due to the loss of fisheries habitat.
- -Increased cost of maintaining flood prone public recreational facilities in flood plain areas.
- -The lost recreational value of flood plain lakes along the Minnesota River due to sediment deposition.

- -The lost recreational value of flood plain lakes along the Minnesota River due to sediment deposition.
- -Increased flood damage due to higher flood levels and longer duration of flooding because sediment deposition in overbank floodplain areas reduced conveyance.
- -The cost of riverbank protection programs such as the Mankato and Shakopee projects to protect public infrastructure.
- -The cost of upgrades to protect public infrastructure such as waste-water treatment facilities, roadways and bridges from higher flood levels and longer duration of flooding.
- -The cost of new water treatment facilities for cities with nitrate contaminated groundwater supplies.
- -The value of crop losses on agricultural properties along the Minnesota River and tributaries due to more frequent flooding.
- -Decreased property values due to more frequent and longer duration of flooding.
- -Damage to private properties along the rivers and tributaries due to bank scour caused by increased peak discharge, more frequent flood flows and longer duration of frequent discharges.
- -The cost to protect private properties along the river and its tributaries from bank scour and bank failures.

Minnesota State Senate 3-8-22 Environment and Natural Resources Finance Committee Testimony on behalf of **S.F. 3044**

Chair Senator Ingebrigtsen and Committee Members,

My name is Scott Sparlin, I am the Coordinator/Facilitator for the Minnesota River Congress and the Executive Director of the Coalition for a Clean Minnesota River. This is my 33rd year working on Minnesota River Watershed issues.

We have reached a water management crisis in Minnesota, certainly not limited to anywhere in the state, but especially evident in the Minnesota River Watershed. Due to land use practices both urban and rural we have now reached the point that if we do not begin to both temporarily and permanently store more water, we will continue to experience increased collective, infrastructural, societal, and business losses at an unacceptable rate putting many Minnesotans at risk. Exacerbating this condition is the climatic trend and future prediction of increased rainfalls in short periods of time. The combination of all these factors leads first to small and medium sized tributary streambank erosion. Then the dislodged sediments combined with the increased rate flows enable even more sediments and nutrients to be delivered to our lakes, major tributaries, and main stems where they then flow downstream to the Mississippi River, Lake Pepin and ultimately the Gulf of Mexico.

We are a water blessed state and the time to invest in a major water storage initiative is upon us. The compelling data concerning the need, especially in the Minnesota River Basin, has been thoroughly studied and is well documented. The fact is, most of society has observed and intuitively known this for a long time. We have engineered ourselves into this condition and we also have the technical knowhow to mitigate it. We now need the commitment, and the significant financial resources, to accomplish the goal. In many cases our government (all of us) paid to create the challenges we are faced with. The time is now for all of us to come together for the greater good of future generations of Minnesotans and those downstream. This is not an investment we can ignore, or we will pay much higher prices in short years to come.

It is our belief that we need specifically targeted temporary and permanent water storage funds to be directed to the implementors such as Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Watershed Districts and participating willing landowners.

Scientific Background

Extensive scientific data collected over decades shows clearly that we need to put more water storage on the landscape. Additional water storage will protect infrastructure and improve water quality. Diverse water storage practices, such as replacing historically drained lakes and

wetlands and increasing soil health, will all help to achieve this goal. The climatic trend and future prediction of increased rainfalls in short periods of time will only exacerbate the issue.

The Minnesota River Congress is using the Collaborative for Sediment Source Reduction (CSSR) and Management Options Simulation Model (MOSM) study recommendations in conjunction with the rich datasets available through state agency monitoring, assessment and conservation targeting (WRAPS, TMDLS, 1W1P) to support the case for the need for more water storage. We have enlisted researchers at state agencies and elsewhere who have completed studies to help provide data and documentation (e.g. Patrick Belmont, Karen Gran, Chris Lenhart, Peter Wilcock and numerous others).

After over 3 years and 25 basin-wide meetings attended by a diverse cross section of the population, it has become very apparent that any way water storage in any form can be accomplished is of the utmost priority. Over and over from every part of the basin we heard water storage has to be addressed if we are going to be serious about protecting our infrastructure and improving our surface water. The good news is it can be achieved without adversely affecting agri-business or community development. We simply need it to be realistically funded to the degree it needs to be effective. It already has been prioritized by the implementers. We have written support from numerous entitles supporting our efforts to see this come to fruition. Here is a daily growing list of support.

Restoration work to prevent river flooding at Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge

The \$4.1 million project will help control water levels on the federal conservation land.

Just a few miles south of Minneapolis, along the final bends of the Minnesota River, large sections of a national wildlife refuge are under water.

The old and failing culverts in the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge can no longer keep up with the increasing rainfall, erosion and intensive draining systems that have caused the river to flow at twice its historical strength. The floods are drowning out native plants and habitats needed by birds and migrating waterfowl, as well as closing some of the hiking trails and bird-watching and hunting land used by about 300,000 visitors a year.


The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will begin a \$4.1 million project this summer to build and replace a series of culverts and structures to lower water levels in the refuge.


The work, which will take about two years to complete, will help restore a wide variety of vegetation critical to migrating birds in a chain of ponds near Shakopee, Eden Prairie and Bloomington, said Eric Mruz, deputy refuge manager.

"Basically, we have lost the ability to manage water levels at several of these ponds and I honestly think that the flooding here is only going to get worse," Mruz said.

Urban refuge

A new bridge at the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge over a stream that runs into the Minnesota River will lessen the need for the The refuge, which was created in the 1970s, is one of only a handful in the country located so close to a major urban area. It stretches along the last 70 miles or so of the Minnesota, from the city of Henderson to Bloomington, just before the river empties into the Mississippi River. It offers one of the rare spots in the Twin Cities where hikers can make it deep into the stillness of a marsh, or walk through one of the last remaining pockets of oak savanna in the state.

More than 50,000 ducks and geese stop in the refuge during spring and fall migrations, according to Audubon Minnesota, which lists the preserve as one of the state's most important bird areas. It's home to more than 260 different species of birds, at least 100 of which are known to nest there, according to the conservation group.

It's a marvel that such a sanctuary exists so close to the more than 4 million people who live in the area, said Robert Petzel, volunteer and president of the Minnesota Valley Refuge Friends organization.

It's home to miles of deep hiking and biking trails, rare trumpeter swans, tundra swans, bluebirds and flickers, he said.

"It's a wonderful place to get away from everything else might that might be going on," Petzel said.

Since the state largely shut down this spring because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the wildlife refuge has also become a refuge for families and hikers from across the metro area and the 14 counties the federal land touches.

What has long been more of a hidden gem is now receiving perhaps the most attention it has ever gotten from the public, Mruz said. In the months since the first cases of COVID-19 were found in Minnesota, the refuge has received about five times as many daily visitors as it had had in previous years.

But the increase in visitors comes as the hydrology of the Minnesota River has changed, according to the Army Corps and a number of federal and state studies.

The river's flow has <u>more than doubled (https://www.startribune.com/as-minnesota-river-expands-erosion-damage-grows/567716172/)</u> over the past decade, meaning water is rushing through with twice the force it did on average from 1950 to 2010. That's largely because the state is receiving more intense storms and rainfall than it has before, including last year, which went down as the wettest in Minnesota's history.

And over the past several decades, landowners in western and central Minnesota have drained more acres for row crops, funneling that water into the river and its tributaries.

The soft soil the Minnesota cuts through has always been prone to erosion. Now with the river's increased strength, the water is rapidly eating away its shoreline, doubling the width of the river in some segments and washing away homes and other structures.

The new drainage and water flow systems in the refuge were designed with the changing hydrology in mind, Mruz said.

"These structures are going to be big enough, we think, to handle that extra load of water," he said.

Gulf of Mexico 'dead zone' predicted to be twice the size of national goal. Again.

Scientists forecast the low-oxygen zone will be around 4,100 square miles this summer, despite federal efforts to reduce nutrient runoff from fertilizer use on Midwest farms.

Scientists have released their 2023 forecast for the so-called "dead zone" in the Gulf of Mexico — predicting it will be about 4,100 square miles this summer. That's much bigger than https://thelensnola.org/2022/08/03/dead-zone-smaller-than-expected-but-bigger-than-desired/), but still smaller than average.


The dead zone is a hypoxic area (https://oceanservice.noaa.gov/hazards/hypoxia/) where low oxygen can kill fish and other marine life. It's caused by excessive nutrient runoff, largely from fertilizer used on farm fields in the Midwest, which ends up in the Mississippi River and flows south to the Gulf.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration uses models and data from the U.S. Geological Survey to forecast the size of the dead zone each year. Data from river and stream gauges showed that nitrate and phosphorus discharges were below average in the Mississippi River and Atchafalaya River, which splits off in south Louisiana.

While some see this season's forecast as good news, it is still well above the federal Hypoxia Task Force (https://www.epa.gov/ms-htf) 's goal of shrinking the dead zone to 1,900 square miles or smaller by 2035. The area's five-year average size is 4,280 square miles, more than double that target, and has trended mostly larger over time (https://www.columbiamissourian.com/priceofplenty/landscape/a-lifetime-of-research-links-gulf-of-mexico-dead-zone-to-midwest-fertilizer-runoff/article 1d216dd2-f9bb-11ed-bba0-5b8d35ccleae.html).

Don Scavia, an emeritus professor at the University of Michigan, leads one of several research teams partnering with the federal government on the annual forecast.

"Lack of a downward trend in the dead zone illustrates that current efforts to reduce those loads have not been effective," he said. "Clearly, the federal and state agencies and Congress continue to prioritize industrial agriculture over water quality."

America's largest water highway is in trouble, ominous for Midwest grain farmers

Sixty percent of America's grain flows down the Mississippi River. Last fall, traffic ground to a halt due to low water, causing concern for Minnesota farmers during harvest.

ON THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER - Jim Kennedy watches the river like a hawk.

From his view 33 feet up in the pilot house, Kennedy stares out wide windows at blackened driftwood, eddies, even sometimes rambunctious yachters steaming up the wide, blue waters of the Mississippi River near St. Paul.

"They're about the worst kind," Kennedy said, on the Tuesday after Labor Day. "Drunk yachters. But they can't be helped."

Another problem that can't be helped? Mother Nature's curveballs, like this year's devastating drought in America's heartland. And another trying year for U.S. agricultural exports, due to the high cost of diesel and lower commodity prices.

In a typical year, 60% of the nation's grain flows downstream to the Gulf of Mexico, loaded onto barges parked at terminals along the Mississippi River. The barges are often tucked below interstate overpasses or along remote stretches of inland waterways, noticed only by boater or beaver.

But, lately, the working river has garnered more attention as concern grows over the aging locks-and-dams system built in the Roosevelt administration. The industry has been further strained by scarce labor and whiplashing weather that at times makes navigability uncertain.

Farmers and grain buyers, including agribusiness titans in the Twin Cities, are increasingly watchful.

"On this part of the river, we're here because of ag," said Lee Nelson, president of Upper River Services. He noted an outstate farmer — say in southern Minnesota — may not want to drive all the way to downtown St. Paul to the Mississippi terminal.

"But he can get to the water [in Savage, Minn.]," Nelson said, referring to the grain terminals in the outer Twin Cities suburb sitting on the Minnesota River.

Kevin Hall, a supply chain vice president at Inver Grove Heights-based CHS, Inc., stared last week at a bank of video screens on the wall of the trading floor of the nation's largest farmer-owned cooperative at the Inver Grove Heights headquarters.

On screen were live-feeds of terminals from Savage on the Minnesota River all the way down to Myrtle Grove, La. The last major floods hit in the 1920s, prompting the U.S. government to begin damming up the Mississippi during the Depression, Hall said.

"It was catastrophic to the communities down the river," he said. "But it was to create this navigable waterway."

The river north of St. Louis — with two dozen locks and dams — is not the problem. The infrastructure there works, keeping a consistent flow for barges moving past Winona, Dubuque, Iowa, and Quincy, Ill., industry sources say.

But lack of water in the whole system could mean a repeat of <u>last year's near-catastrophe</u>when water levels dropped too low for steel-bottomed barges to traverse.

"When the Mississippi River had disruption last year, it was a major disruption to the country," Hall said.

Last fall, barge traffic on the southern portion of the Mississippi River — part of an intermodal system of riverways, highways and railways once the envy of the world — ground to a halt.

Television news carried images of more than 2,000 barges stuck in a queue. The U.S. Coast Guard briefly halted traffic in Memphis and Vicksburg, Miss., after boats ran aground on sandbars, An AccuWeather report estimated river snags cost the country \$20 billion.

As this year's harvest begins, water levels on the storied Mississippi are once again dropping. The river is below 5-feet deep in the Quad Cities on the Iowa-Illinois border. More than 50% of Minnesota is currently in at least "severe" drought, according to a national monitor. In St. Louis, barge rates — the per-ton cost to ship on the river — are spiking.

And the row-croppers of the Upper Midwest, who need the floating vessels to carry their corn or soybeans to the world, are watching with trepidation.

"As harvest approaches, really all we can do is wait to see what happens with the river," Brad Hovel, a Cannon Falls farmer and secretary of Minnesota Soybean Growers Association, said. "We might be eating our basis."

A farmer's basis — that is, the profit farmers can make at the elevator over futures contracts posted in Chicago — could weaken if the U.S. Coast Guard imposes greater draft restrictions (how deep a boat can dip below the water's surface) to protect boats from running aground.

Hovel said farmers in his neighborhood of southeastern Minnesota can put grain on rail, often traveling up to the Twin Ports in Duluth or out to the Pacific Northwest. They might also truck grain to two crush facilities in Mankato. But the terminals along the Mississippi are vital.

"We've only got a little bit of wiggle room," Hovel said.

The challenges couldn't hit at worse time, as U.S. farmers fight to reclaim past supremacy in exports. This year, Brazilian farmers are on path to surpass U.S. corn-growers as the world's top exporter. Brazil is tops in soybean, too, overcoming supply challenges that long bedeviled the South American aggiant.

Justin Cauley, CHS' senior director of transportation, said Brazil farmers are reporting 40-day lines at some terminals.

"A [bulk] vessel sitting costs about \$20 [thousand] to \$30,000 a day," Cauley said. "They're able to let their vessels sit for 40 days and still be competitive against the U.S."

Those on the working river say what's needed is infrastructure upgrades. The 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill that passed Congress and was signed by President Joe Biden allocated \$2.5 billion for the inland waterways. Ongoing dredging of the river — such as two low spots near Savage this past summer — is an evergreen need, as well.

But industry officials say they also need more workers interested in joining a boat.

Back in the waterways near St. Paul, Kennedy is at home on his boat. There's a fridge for long days. He arrives by 6 a.m. and often works until dark. He likes the job and sleeps each night at home in Cottage Grove. He's seen early morning fishermen, wildlife and scenes along the river that most recreationists and oil painters dream of.

Nestled between two windows, a placard dedicated to his son, Joseph Kennedy, an Army specialist who was killed in Afghanistan in 2011, reads "Some Gave All."

"He worked here," Jim said, quietly. "He was a good worker."


Out on driftwood, a bald eagle was perched, surveying the region. Kennedy says he didn't see those big birds in his first couple of decades on the river. But the waterway — and the life around the banks — keeps changing.




- Mean discharge doubled, more frequent extreme peak discharges, greater flow volume.

- Many streams in upper watershed are impaired for bacteria.




Annual mean discharge for the Minnesota River near Jordan (05330000) (USGS 2020)







Summary

In accordance with Minnesota Statutes, the LMRWD must designate a newspaper of general circulation in each county of the District as the general newspaper in which all hearing notices, advertising for bids, etc. are required to be published.

Since 2016, the LMRWD has used the Star Tribune as its official newspaper. The Star Tribune is qualified to serve as the legal and official newspaper under Minnesota Statutes Section 331A.02 Subd. 1. Staff would recommend this designation again for 2024. The Board should adopt Resolution 24-01 Designation of the 2024 Official District Newspaper.

Alternatives to the Star Tribune would be *Finance and Commerce*. Or designation of local newspaper in individual cities, such as the *Chaska Herald, Chanhassen Villager, Savage Pacer, Shakopee Valley News, Sun Current Newspaper* (Bloomington and Eden Prairie), *Sun Patriot* (Carver), *Sun This Week* (Eagan and Burnsville). There are no local newspapers similar in nature to serve the Cities of Mendota and Mendota Heights. The official newspaper for the City of Mendota Heights is the *St. Paul Pioneer Press*.

Summary

The Minnesota's Government Data Practices Act requires that all government entities in Minnesota adopt policies regarding access to government data. The policies explain how members of the public can access government data and provide contact information for the City staff members responsible for receiving and processing data practices requests. The District must update these policies by August 1 each year. Also, Minnesota Statutes require the District to appoint an individual as the Data Practices Compliance Officer and Responsible Authority.

The LMRWD Data Practices was adopted in 2014 and can be found on the LMRWD website using this link.

In accordance with MN Statutes and the LMRWD's Data Practices Policy, the Managers should annually designate a Data Practice Compliance Official, who is responsible to respond to public requests for LMRWD Data.

In the past the LMRWD Administrator has served as the Data Practices Compliance Official. It is recommended that the Board adopt the attached Resolution 2022-02 Appointing 2022 Data Practices Compliance Official and Responsible Authority.

Summary

According to the Agreement for Administrative Services between the Lower Minnesota River Watershed District and Naiad Consulting, LLC., 150 hours per month for Administrative services are authorized. Additional hours of services were provided in 2023 and the Board should authorize payment for the additional hours of services provided to the LMRWD by Naiad Consulting, LLC. An additional 42 hours of administrative services was provided in 2023. At the regular rate of \$75/hour that totals \$3,150. The additional hours are reflected on the invoices provided to the LMRWD throughout 2023.

In addition, it is necessary for Naiad Consulting to increase its hourly rates to \$90/hour to account for inflation and increased costs. This increase will make the expense for Administrative Services more comparable with the cost other water management organizations pay for similar services. Rates have not been increased since 2019.

The Administrative Services agreement between the LMRWD and Naiad Consulting and amendments are attached for the Board's information.

 - Facilitate the implementation of the updated LMRWD's Watershed Management Plan that sets strategic direction, goals, policies and work plans for the next 10 years.
 - Establish processes to increase the organization's efficiency and to reduce duplication of effort.
 - Serve as the primary point of contact for LMRWD's business and coordinate activities among consultants.
 - Provide coordination with representatives of City, County, State and Federal agencies and other stakeholder groups.
 - Coordinate consultants' projects and activities; review invoices and recommend payment.
 - Identify opportunities to secure grant funding and develop partnerships to accomplish the LMRWD's Watershed Management Plan.
 - Track implementation of watershed-funded annual water quality projects and activities to ensure that established objectives, project budgets, and schedules are met
 - Develop an operation and capital budget on an annual basis for consideration by the Board.
 - Develop an annual work plan and reporting system in consultation with the Board.
 - Develop agendas for meetings; attend the monthly Board meetings, special TAC meetings and others as necessary.
 - Maintain a list of items that need to be completed by the Consultant, Managers and other consultants and the expected completion date for each item.
 - Prepare a monthly summary of work completed and time expended by work task and budget item.
 - Perform other duties or activities as may be directed by the Board.

(hereinafter "Services").

For the remainder of 2013 the LMRWD sets aside \$ 300 for time and expenses related to the Contractor's position. Contractor will prepare and maintain a work plan and schedule of priorities, in consultation with the Board or its authorized

benefits, medical and hospital benefits, sick and vacation leave, severance pay, pension benefits or other rights or benefits offered to employees of the LMRWD. Contractor (and any person working for or employed by Contractor) shall not be considered an employee of the LMRWD for any purpose including, but not limited to income tax withholding; workers' compensation; unemployment compensation; FICA taxes; liability for torts; and eligibility for benefits.

Contractor will not be provided with a place of business and will retain control over the manner and means of the services provided by Contractor as an independent contractor. Contractor will provide, at Contractor's expense, necessary office space, transportation, computer capability, an internet email address and incidental office supplies needed to provide the Services.

This Agreement is non-exclusive. Contractor may take other employment or contracts that do not interfere with Contractor's duties hereunder.

- DATA PRACTICES AND RECORDS: All records, information, materials and other work 8. product, in written, electronic, or any other form, developed in connection with providing services under this Agreement shall be the exclusive property of the LMRWD. All such records shall be maintained with the records of the LMRWD and in accordance with the instructions of the Board. When operating under standard business practices, the Contractor will not be held liable for the loss of LMRWD's records which may be held by Contractor outside of the LMRWD's offices. The Contractor will comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act and all other applicable state and federal laws relating to data privacy or confidentiality. If Contractor receives a request for data pursuant to the Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13 (DPA), that may encompass data (as that term is defined in the DPA) Contractor possesses or has created as a result of this Agreement, it will inform the LMRWD immediately and transmit a copy of the request to the Board. If the request is addressed to the LMRWD, Contractor will not provide any information or documents, but will direct the inquiry to the Board. If the request is addressed to Contractor, Contractor will notify and consult with the Board and its legal counsel before replying. Nothing in the preceding sentence supersedes Contractor's obligations under this Agreement with respect to protection of LMRWD's data, property rights in data or confidentiality. Nothing in this section constitutes a determination that Contractor is performing a governmental function within the meaning of Minnesota Statutes Section 13.05, subdivision 11, or otherwise expands the applicability of the DPA beyond its scope under governing law.
- COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS: Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state

Summary

In 2019, Carver County Water Management Organization (CCWMO) approached the LMRWD about partnering on a project to reduce sediment in West Chaska Creek. The Board agreed with the premise of the project and in 2020, entered into a cooperative agreement with the CCWMO.

The actual project is located upstream of the boundaries of the LMRWD. The project, as proposed, planned to re-meander approximately 1,100 linear feet of a ditched segment of West Chaska Creek. Lengthening the channel (by introducing meanders) will reduce water velocity, lower sheer stress on the banks, reconnect the creek to its floodplain and reduce the amount of sediment transported downstream to the Minnesota River. Based on upstream reference reaches and changes observed since the creek was straightened, the projects proposed reduction in Total Suspended Solids (TSS) is estimated at 4,400 pounds per year for 30 years. This project is a partnership with Carver County WMO, who is responsible for development and execution of the project. The LMRWD agreed to contribute \$50,000 to the project. Payment of \$27,441 for the first phase of the project was made in June 2022. The final invoice for \$22,559 was received in January 2024. Tim Sundby, Water Resources Supervisor for the Carver County WMO offered to host a tour of the project.

West Chaska Creek is on the 2024 draft 303d Impaired Waters list. Upstream of Creek Road, where this project is located, the affected designated use for the Creek is Aquatic Life. Fish bioassessments and Benthic macroinvertebrates bioassessments are the listed pollutant or stressor. Downstream of Creek Road, Aquatic Recreation is the affected designated use impairment of the Creek by Fecal Coliform.

This agreement dated ______ between <u>Carver County Water Management Organization (CCWMO)</u> and the <u>Lower Minnesota River Watershed District (LMRWD)</u> is entered into in order to establish stormwater BMPs as outlined within this agreement.

This Agreement covers lands in T 115 N, R 23 W, S. 6 adjacent and within the following watercourse West Chaska Creek (AUID: 07020012-802), as specified in the project proposal. The term of this Agreement shall be ten (10) years from the date of project construction completion.

- I. Project Summary:
 - A) The project will re-meander approximately 1,100 linear feet of a ditched segment of West Chaska Creek – resulting in a longer, more sinuous channel that more closely mimics unaltered channel conditions.
 - B) Lengthening the channel will reduce water speeds, lower sheer stress on the banks, reduce numbers and frequency of bank failure, reconnect the stream to its floodplain, and reduce the amount of sediment transported downstream. Based on upstream reference reaches and changes observed since the stream was straightened, the re-meander project will reduce total suspended solids by an estimated 4,400 lbs/yr.
 - C) LMRWD will reimburse CCWMO \$50,000 of documented project costs.
 - D) This project is Phase 2 of the West Chaska Creek Remeander Project. Phase 2 will incorporate connecting the existing ditch to five meanders that were completed in Phase 1, the disconnection of a tile line main from the ditch to a new shallow depression, plugging of the ditch between meanders, final grading, and planting of native vegetation.

II. CCWMO RESPONSIBILITIES

A) The CCWMO is responsible for maintaining the project for a period of ten (10) years to ensure that the conservation objective of this practice is met. CCWMO will return to LMRWD any cost share funds it already received under paragraph II. B, in the event that this condition is not satisfied. Minimum maintenance includes watering when needed during the first year or two and removing all invasive and exotic species that encroach on the project as discovered.

- B) CCWMO agrees to the terms of installation, maintenance and monitoring outlined in the approved project proposal. Construction of the project will be in accordance with good engineering practices and generally accepted guidelines for Best Management Practices. Acceptable guidelines include Local Water Plan Standards, Rules and Regulations and the MPCA guidelines within "Stormwater Manual".
- C) CCWMO agrees to allow LMRWD access to the project area for construction, maintenance, evaluation and monitoring of the project during installation and post completion. CCWMO agrees to make the site available as a demonstration site to the general public with prior notification.
- D) CCWMO is responsible to bid, construct, and maintain the Project. The Landowner shall secure all necessary permits for the project.
- E) CCWMO will submit to LMRWD Staff proof of Project expenditures and proof of Project completion.
- F) Carver County Staff will monitor the Project periodically to evaluate short- and long-term performance. Data collected as a result of this monitoring effort will be made available to both the Landowner and to the general public.

III. LMRWD RESPONSIBILITIES

- A) LMRWD assumes no liability for injury or damage, other than that caused by its own negligence, in the project area. The Project Cooperator assumes no jurisdiction over the project area for purposes of controlling trespass, noxious weeds, granting rights-of-way, or other incidents of ownership.
- B) LMRWD is financially responsible as a cost share \$50,000
- C) Upon LMRWD acceptance of the Project's completion after Final Inspection or within one year of this date of this agreement, whichever is later, LMRWD will release 100 per cent of its cost share amount as described previously. Final inspection will include verification of specified items and connections.
- D) As a condition subsequent to LMRWD obligations herein, CCWMO must maintain the Project through completion of the Project and for a period of ten (10) years after installation. CCWMO will return to LMRWD any cost share funds it already received under paragraph II. B, in the event that this condition is not satisfied.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS:

- A) This Agreement may be amended by mutual consent of CCWMO and LMRWD. LMRWD shall have no obligation to restore the land to its original condition upon expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- B) Nothing contained in this agreement is intended or shall be construed in any manner as creating or establishing a partnership, joint venture, or agency relationship between parties.
- C) Except if arising from or out of LMRWD Staff's fault or negligence, CCWMO agrees to indemnify and defend LMRWD Staff, its successors, and assigns against and will hold harmless LMRWD Staff, its successors, and assigns from any claims, expenses, or damages, including attorney's fees, arising from CCWMO performance of this agreement.
- D) This agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of CCWMO and LMRWD, and their respective successors and assigns: provided, however, that neither party may assign this agreement without the prior written consent of the other. Any modification, alteration, amendments, deletions, or waivers of the provisions of this agreement will be valid only when mutually agreed upon in writing by both parties.

- E) This agreement will be effective as of the date of all signatures required below have been provided. The date of the last signature will be the date of this agreement and will be inserted in the first paragraph on page 1.
- F) Each party shall be liable for its own acts to the extent provided by law and hereby agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend the other, its officers and employees against any and all liability, loss, costs, damages, expenses, claims or actions, including attorney's fees which the other, its officers and employees may hereafter sustain, incur or be required to pay, arising out of or by reason of any act or omission of the party, its agents, servants or employees, in the execution or performance or failure to adequately perform its obligations pursuant to this Agreement.
- G) It is understood and agreed that the County's liability shall be limited by the provisions of Minn.Stat.Chap.466 and/or other applicable law.
- H) Subject to the requirements of Minnesota Statutes Section 16C.05, Subd. 5 (as may be amended), the parties agree that the County of Carver, the State Auditor, the Legislative Auditor or any of their duly authorized representatives at any time during normal business hours, and as often as they may reasonably deem necessary, shall have access to and the right to examine, audit, excerpt and transcribe any books, documents, papers, records, etc. which are pertinent to the accounting practices and procedures of the parties and involve transactions relating to this Agreement. Such materials shall be maintained and such access and rights shall be in force and effect during the period of the contract and for six (6) years after its termination or cancellation.

LOWER MINNESOTA RIVER WATERSHED DISTRICT 2023 COST SHARE INCENTIVE AND WATER QUALITY RESTORATION PROGRAM Cost Share Grant Agreement

The parties to this Agreement, made this <u>21st</u> day of <u>June</u> 2023, are the Lower Minnesota River Watershed District, a Minnesota Watershed District ("LMRWD") a public body with purposes and powers set forth in Minnesota Statutes Chapters 103B and 103D and Marianne Cartwright ("APPLICANT"). The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the installation and maintenance of a project designed to protect and improve natural resources within the District, by managing storm water and said project to be located at: 11115 Normandale Boulevard, Bloomington, MN 55437.

- Scope of Work. APPLICANT will install the Project in accordance with the Application submitted to the LMRWD, attached as Exhibit A. A final report must be presented to the LMRWD at the time a request is made for reimbursement of expenses as specified in Section 2 of this Agreement.
- 2. Reimbursement. When the installation of the project is complete in accordance with Exhibit A, the LMRWD, on receipt of adequate documentation, will reimburse the APPLICANT up to 50% of the APPLICANT's cost to install the Project, including materials, equipment rental, delivery of materials and labor, in an amount not to exceed \$1,316. APPLICANT will document with receipts all direct expenditures. At the time reimbursement is requested, APPLICANT will provide the LMRWD with copies of all documents concerning the work. Volunteer time and labor will be considered an in-kind contribution and may be used as a match, but APPLICANT will not receive reimbursement for in-kind contributions. Labor may be credited at \$20.00 per hour.
- 3. Public Access. LMRWD may enter APPLICANT's property at reasonable times to inspect the work to ensure compliance with this Agreement and monitor or take samples for the purpose of assessing the performance of the Project. APPLICANT will permit the LMRWD, at its cost and discretion, to place reasonable signage on APPLICANTs property informing the general public about the Project and the LMRWD's Cost Share Incentive and Water Quality Restoration Program. The LMRWD may request APPLICANT's permission to allow members of the public periodically to enter APPLICANT's property to view the Project in the company of a LMRWD representative. This paragraph does not create any right of public entry onto APPLICANT's property except as coordinated with APPLICANT and accompanied by a LMRWD representative.
- 4. <u>Maintenance</u>. APPLICANT will maintain the Project for at least five (5) years from the date installation is complete. If APPLICANT does not do so, the LMRWD will have a right to reimbursement of all amounts paid to APPLICANT, unless:
 - a. The LMRWD determines that the failure to maintain the Project was caused by reasons beyond the APPLICANT's control; or
 - b. APPLICANT has conveyed the underlying property, provided APPLICANT notifies the LMRWD at least 30 days before the property is conveyed and facilitates communication between the LMRWD and the prospective owner regarding continued maintenance of the project.

- 5. <u>Agreement Void.</u> This Agreement is void if the project installation in not complete by November 30, 2023. This Agreement may not be modified in any way except in writing and signed by both parties.
- 6. <u>Indemnification</u>. The LMRWD will be held harmless against all liability and loss in connection with the installation of the Project.
- 7. <u>Compliance with Laws.</u> APPLICANT is responsible to comply with any permits or other legal requirements applicable to the work.
- 8. <u>Notices.</u> Any notice or demand, authorized or required under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be addressed to the other party as follows:

LOWER MINNESOTA RIVER WATERSHED DISTRICT BOARD OF MANAGERS WEDNESDAY, June 21, 2023 MEETING MINUTES

Attorney Kolb reviewed his presentation on the One Watershed One Plan operational arrangements. He discussed joint power entities, determining an appropriate structure, and the decisions that need to be made prior to entering one of these agreements. He also discussed the key elements of implementation for a One Watershed One Plan. He stated that they do not have to decide tonight on whether or not they participate in this, but they will need to make the decision soon.

Administrator Loomis discussed that part of this has to do with the amount of sediment and nutrients that are coming from upstream, in areas that are outside of a certain district. She gave the example of Scott County and how the upper part of Sand Creek is outside of their county, and they are not able to do projects in that area. She added that it is possible that this plan may impact the LMRWD's ability to get watershed-based implementation funding as funding may be split.

The Board discussed the values and the drawbacks of this plan.

Attorney Kolb reviewed the difference between a joint powers collaboration or a joint powers entity.

Administrator Loomis shared that the LMRWD has given funding to projects that were outside of the district and stated that there is nothing prohibiting them from giving these funds as long as they see it as beneficial to the district.

The Board gave feedback on the information that was presented at this meeting. No action required.

6. OLD BUSINESS

A. 2021 Financial Audit

Administrator Loomis introduced this item and shared that Redpath and Company has agreed to doing a two year audit which will cost \$25,000 per year. She shared the recommendation from legal counsel to get the legislature to give resources to the Office of the State Auditor so that they can provide audit services to some of the smaller, local governmental units, such as watershed districts. Legal counsel noted that the LMRWD is not alone in its difficulty finding auditors and getting audits prepared. She stated that they will be sending a letter to the former audit firm. Attorney Kolb stated that this letter should go out within the next week.

President Hartmann made a motion to authorize a request for proposals to provide audit services for FY 2023. Manager Amundson seconded the motion. Upon a vote being taken, the motion carried unanimously.

B. 2027 World EXPO – "Healthy People, Healthy Planet – Wellness and Well Being for All" Administrator Loomis introduced and provided background on this item. Bloomington was not chosen as the site of the 2027 World Expo.

C. 2023 Cost Share Applications

Administrator Loomis reviewed the five applications for cost share projects. She stated that the total of all five projects would come to over \$21,000 and funding could come from the Water Resource Restoration fund.

The Board asked if they would not accept any other applications for the rest of the year. Administrator Loomis explained that decision is up to the Board. She noted that there is an applicant that is interested in submitting an application, but that is for a project for 2024.

LOWER MINNESOTA RIVER WATERSHED DISTRICT BOARD OF MANAGERS WEDNESDAY, June 21, 2023 MEETING MINUTES

The Board discussed potentially limiting funding to the same groups to every other year and not back to back years.

Administrator Loomis shared that she has looked into cost share programs for other watershed districts and stated that the LMRWD is the most conservative. She added that there will be a draft budget at the July meeting.

The Board discussed the May deadline being a little late in the year for these applications to be submitted.

Manager Amundson made a motion to approve all cost share applications as presented and the amounts requested. Manager Kuplic seconded the motion. Manager Salvato offered a friendly amendment to the motion, asking that LMRWD staff evaluate cost share programs offered by other watershed districts and recommend changes to the LMRWD. Managers Amundson and Kuplic accepted Manager Salvato's amendment. Upon a vote being taken, the motion carried unanimously.

D. City of Carver Levee

No new information to report since the last update.

E. Dredge Management

i. Vernon Avenue Dredge Material Management site

Administrator Loomis introduced this item and provided an update on the project to improve Vernon Avenue.

ii. Private Dredge Material Placement

No new information to report since last update.

F. Watershed Management Plan

No new information to report since the last update.

G. 2023 Legislative Action

Administrator Loomis introduced and provided background on this item. She discussed the projects that received funding.

The Board asked about the funding provided for water storage. Administrator Loomis explained that BWSR is going to try to identify larger projects and how they can make more of a difference with water storage.

H. Education and Outreach Plan

No new information to report since the last update.

I. LMRWD Projects

(Only projects that require Board action will appear on the agenda. Informational updates will appear on the Administrator Report)

i. Area #3

Administrator Loomis introduced and provided background on this item. She shared that she met with the property owners on site at the propety and she asked them to consider selling the portion of their property or allowing an easement for the property in the City's right-of-way for Riverview Road and the river. She noted that State funds can be used for this purchase. She stated that they will need to determine how they can raise their match from the State. She added that she contacted a consulting firm who may be able to assist and

Linda,

Hi. For some reason, I didn't see your email. Yes, I am finished! Here's the overview. I will send in the details with photos today.

I have completed work on my rain garden at 11115 Normandale Blvd. Over the course of the projects some adjustments were made. The property was surveyed prior to the installation of the project as I purchased the property just over a year ago and thought I should verify the property line. The north property line was not where the previous owner had shown me it was. The buildings and fencing and hedges don't run parallel to the property line which results in more of a wedge shape to my property along the north side of my class IV driveway. This resulted in too narrow of a space to place the swale/raingarden along the north edge of the driveway. I relocated the raingarden project to the opposite side of the driveway- the south side and at the end of the driveway – south of the garage where the same drainage from the driveway and north side of the roof of the house could be achieved.

The second area of adjustments has occurred secondary to the weather extremes we have experienced over this past summer/fall with higher temperatures and lower rainfall with some rain events later in the season and, not insignificantly, rain in the forecast for the end of the calendar year.

- The temperature was monitored along the original proposed site for the raingarden in a temporary raised garden bed. The temperature in this bed reached 120 degrees more than once over the summer. If I would have located the project along the driveway, I would have had to provide significant supplemental water to the plantings and install a shade structure.
- I did not place piping under the class IV driveway as this area is used by delivery trucks as the only functioning entrance is at the rear of my house. I consulted two different sources on having a buried drain tile and both stated that freezing would be an issue and heavy trucks could be problematic.
- The overall cost of the project was reduced secondary to the relocation of the raingarden.
- An added area of rock was added for capturing and slowing snow melt off of the area where in a snowy year the snow is piled up.
- The final location will provide a source of water for plants that are supportive of my firefly population (They appear just east of the garage.)

The integrity of the overall design was maintained. The late season planting was successful, if limited in plant availability. Supplemental plants were ordered for spring planting to provide the raingarden with the variety in the original plan. The raingarden was successful in the trial rain we had in October! The garden captured water, bubbling out of the pop up emitter and trickling down through the river pebble area off the driveway, and the piping didn't show any signs of leaking.

I have implemented two areas for rain barrels in the design to hold supplemental water.

I have also adapted the downspouts for a winter that may fluctuate between rain/snow events with access to above ground piping/water capture if it is a rain event with warm enough temperatures to run the water off the roof into the garden. The projects isn't all that pretty now, but I am looking forward to next spring and summer! I have given many mini tours of the garden project and have a number of neighbors, co-workers, and friends who are awaiting tours when the plants start growing!







The benefits of rain gardens

- Whether you live in the city or along a lake or river, managing stormwater runoff is important.
- Rooftops, roads, driveways and sidewalks are hard surfaces that prevent rainwater and melting snow from reaching the soil and soaking into the ground. These hard surfaces also collect nutrient-rich yard and pet waste, oil and radiator fluid from autos, and other debris and pollutants.

Runoff:

Washes debris and pollutants away, often directly into lakes, rivers and wetlands.

Erodes soil and carries it into our surface waters.

Can affect aquatic life if warm runoff enters lakes and rivers directly.

In summer, runoff is often warmed as it flows over hard surfaces.

Rain gardens:

Collect stormwater runoff and prevent it from flowing directly into lakes, rivers and wetlands.

Allow runoff to soak into the soil so sediments settle, and plants absorb nutrients.

Filter out pollutants from water before entering the groundwater.

Prevent erosion by holding soil in place with their deep roots.

Attract birds and butterflies.

Require little watering and maintenance once established.

The City of Burnsville (City) provided notification of a new Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for CenterPoint Energy to allow work within the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Floodplain and Shoreland of the Minnesota River and Black Dog Lake to abandon its existing 16-inch diameter (natural gas) steel transmission line located at 1400 Black Dog Road East and 11500 12th Avenue South, Burnsville, MN (Figure 1). The project's engineer, ERM, provided site plans for review. The City asked for review of the comments and response to Marcus Green, ERM, by January 3, 2024.

The proposed project consists of abandoning approximately 8,886 feet of its existing Portland Line steel natural gas transmission line. The existing 16-inch-diameter transmission line will be filled and abandoned beneath Black Dog Lake, the Minnesota River, and within the boundaries of the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge. The project anticipates disturbing 0.08 acres, which includes six excavations to complete the abandonment procedures. All the excavation locations will be backfilled. The project is located within the High Value Resource Area (HVRA), Steep Slopes Overlay District (SSOD), and Minnesota River floodplain in both Hennepin and Dakota counties and the cities of Burnsville and Bloomington. The applicant proposes to begin pipeline abandonment in June 2024 and it is anticipated that it will take several weeks to complete.

The City has its municipal permit for Rule B: Erosion and Sediment Control and Rule F: Steep Slopes Overlay District. Therefore, the project will require an LMRWD Individual Permit for Rule C: Floodplain and Drainage Alteration. The purpose of this memo is to summarize the preliminary review that Young Environmental Consulting Group (Young

The LMRWD received the following documents for review:

- Burnsville Conditional Use Permit Amendment, by CenterPoint Energy; dated November 28, 2023; received December 21, 2023.
- Plans and documentation, by CenterPoint Energy and ERM; dated November 21, 2023; received December 21, 2023.
- Project narrative; received December 21, 2023.
- Site Plan, by CenterPoint Energy; dated October 19, 2023; received December 21, 2023.

Rule C – Floodplain and Drainage Alteration

The LMRWD requires the applicant to provide documentation that the proposed floodplain fill will not cause an increase in the 100-year water surface elevations. The project is located within the Minnesota River floodway, as seen on the FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) Panel 27037C0070E (effective December 2, 2011) with a 100-year flood elevation of 715.0 feet National Geodetic Vertical Datum of 1929 (NGVD 29) at cross-section T.

The project anticipates 31 cubic yards of excavation in the floodway located near Black Dog Road, with an additional 14 cubic yards of excavation within the floodplain near CenterPoint Energy's Dakota Station Facility. CenterPoint plans to install a temporary 3,000-square-foot workspace, which will be utilized to access the excavation. Final grading proposes to restore the excavation sites to pre-construction contours.

To comply with Rule C, the applicant must provide a no-rise certification signed by a professional engineer and supporting calculations to demonstrate that the proposed impacts (although temporary) will not result in a loss of flood conveyance capacity or cause a rise in the 100-year flood elevation of the Minnesota River. We recommend the prospective applicant review LMRWD Rule C, Sections 4.4 and 4.5 for further information regarding compliance.

Additional Considerations

The project proposes excavation within wetlands on the project site. Excavation dewatering may be required in the wetland areas. We request that the applicant provide additional information about whether the project has undergone a Wetland Conservation Act (WCA) review. All discharge plans must be routed to areas where there is no standing water through sediment bags and weed-free hay-bale structures to prevent sediment introduction into the adjacent wetlands.

A pervious nearby CenterPoint project, 2022 MBL Nicollet River Crossing (LMRWD No. 2022-002), experienced groundwater flows during trenching activities. The contractor backfilled the trench with native soils and compacted the material to prevent further seepage. There was no further evidence of groundwater seepage. The LMRWD is increasingly concerned about the potential negative impacts of deep excavations on groundwater.

The MBL Nicollet River Crossing project also identified threatened and endangered species. We request that the applicant provide a status update about any reviews or coordination that has been completed to minimize potential disturbances to threatened and endangered species (i.e. a cultural resources review).

Because the project has proposed excavation locations within the City of Bloomington, we request that the applicant provide an update on project coordination that has occurred with the City of Bloomington. The LMRWD will require project approval from both the City of Burnsville and the City of Bloomington before issuing a permit.


Recommendations

No board action is required at this time. As presented, CenterPoint Energy must obtain an LMRWD Individual Project permit before the start of construction activities for the applicable LMRWD rules. We offer the following summarized comments to the project to help facilitate the permit review process:

- Review LMRWD <u>Rule C</u>, especially the "Criteria" and "Required Information" and "Exhibits" sections to determine the requirements for compliance.
- For compliance with LMRWD Rule C, provide a no-rise certification signed by a
 professional engineer and calculations to demonstrate that the proposed
 excavation and access road (although temporary) would not result in a loss of
 flood conveyance capacity nor cause a rise in the 100-year flood elevation of the
 Minnesota River.
- The LMRWD will require approval from the City of Burnsville and the City of Bloomington.
- The LMRWD will require a status update on the WCA review information once available.
- The LMRWD will require a status update about any cultural resources review that may have occurred in the project area.
- The LMRWD encourages early coordination for complex projects and suggests scheduling a pre-application meeting to discuss the LMRWD permitting process and requirements.

Summary

Sale of Dredge Material - At the September 20, 2023, Board of Managers meeting, the Board authorized the sale of the dredge material from the MN River to maintain the 9-foot Channel. M & J Trucking has agreed to purchase 54,889 cubic yards of material at a price of \$2/cubic yard. M & J Trucking has been invoiced and I am in the process of getting a purchase agreement.

Dredging at the mouth of the River – The LMRWD has not received an invoice for the cost to transport dredge material from the mouth of the river to the dredge placement site at River Mile Post 14.2.

Private Dredge Material Placement – LS Marine provided the quantity of private dredge material placed on the Vernon Avenue dredge placement site in 2023. The notice of quantities provided by LS Marine is attached for the Board's information. Invoices have been sent to Cargill, CHS and Savage Riverport.

The public comment period for permit renewals for dredging of the private terminals closed January 4, 2023. Licensees had some questions regarding the LMRWD's management of the Vernon Avenue dredge placement site, which were answered and the LMRWD has not received any additional communications.

Vernon Avenue Rehabilitation and Culvert Replacement Project – Activity on the Vernon Avenue Improvements will likely resume now that Hannah LeClaire has returned from Maternity leave.

The USACE said the agreement between the LMRWD and the USACE agreeing to transport material from the mouth of the river up to the LMRWD placement site in Savage must be amended. The Agreement is currently with USACE Division for approval.

President Hartmann made a motion to authorize payment to the USACE for transport of material dredged at the mouth of the Minnesota River to the LMRWD placement site at RMP 14.2 and to execute an amendment to the Memorandum of Agreement between the USACE and the LMRWD, subject to review and approval of said amendment by LMRWD legal counsel. Manager Amundson seconded the motion. Upon a vote being taken, the motion carried unanimously.

ii. Sale of Dredge Material

Administrator Loomis introduced this item and shared that LS Marine has someone interested in purchasing the stockpile of dredge material on the dredge site. She noted that she is waiting for a purchase agreement for this.

Manager Kuplic made a motion to authorize the sale of dredge material subject to the receipt of a purchase agreement subject to review and approval of said agreement by LMRWD legal counsel.

iii. Private Dredge Material Placement

Administrator Loomis introduced and provided an update on this item. She stated that she heard from the Savage Riverport and received a check from them. She noted that she also heard from CHS who ordered a check and which should be received by the end of the week. She added that both Savage Riverport and CHS have provided certificates of insurance, as well as renewed performance bonds. She said she had not heard from Cargill.

iv. Vernon Avenue reconstruction and culvert replacement project

Manager Amundson noted that a different cross section for the roadway was being requested by the City of Savage. Manager Amundson wondered if the request was sufficient for the purpose of hauling material off the site. Ms. Young said yes. Ms. LeClaire explained that this was discussed with Bolton & Menk and it was determined that the roadway could be reduced to allow for a shoulder and that that is the width of the current roadway. She stated that they also reached out to LS Marine to confirm this.
